WELCOME TO OUR 17TH YEAR OF HOMESCHOOL ENRICHMENT

Legacy is designed to offer homeschool enrichment electives to parents who are homeschooling in the state of Washington under the Home-Based Instruction law, RCW 28A.200.010. We meet Thursdays, September through June (see calendar for specific dates), at Overlake Christian Church, located at 9900 Willows Road NE, Redmond, WA.

Legacy Homeschool Center is not a school, and does not employ teachers. They are under the employ of the families who have students attending their classes. Teachers determine the course content, materials, and cost of each class. All teachers are required to sign and be in agreement with our Statement of Faith and Mission Statement (available upon request).

The heart of Legacy Homeschool Center is *homeschooling*, which necessitates parents' involvement in their children's education, classes, and day-to-day experiences to achieve maximum effectiveness. In order to get the most benefit from classes, parents are highly encouraged to attend class with their children.

All parents are required to:

- Fulfill an assigned job and be available to provide additional assistance if needed
- Remain within Legacy boundaries the entire time your children are at Legacy
- Adhere to Legacy policies and expectations, and enforce them with your children
- Pay tuition for classes on or before the Tuition Due date
- Submit a copy of the Declaration of Intent to homeschool by September 25, 2014, for each child in your family age 8 and older who is attending Legacy

The following pages discuss the function of our co-op in detail. It is important that you read this packet thoroughly, including **LEGACY POLICIES AND EXPECTATIONS**. Upon understanding how we function and what your responsibilities will be, you can determine whether Legacy is a good fit for you and your family. Parents are expected to review policies and expectations with their children prior to the first class. *Failure to fulfill the requirements listed above and/or adhere to the policies on the following pages will jeopardize your privilege to participate in this co-op.*

LEGACY POLICIES AND EXPECTATIONS

GENERAL POLICIES AT LEGACY

As a cooperative organization, all parents are responsible to enforce co-op rules and expectations. This plays a vital role in ensuring a high standard is maintained for conduct, attitude, and safety at our co-op. Legacy students benefit immensely from the presence and influence of our dedicated parents on-site each week.

Legacy policy requires that a parent or permanent legal guardian remain within Legacy boundaries the entire time his or her children are at Legacy. Extended family members are not allowed to come in place of a parent other than pursuant to the Parent Absence Policy, defined below. Parents assume full responsibility for their children at all times while at Legacy, and will be contacted if disciplinary problems arise. **Sitting in a car or dropping off children is not allowed.**

Parent Absence Policy: In order to limit the number of classes a student may need to miss due to unforeseen or unavoidable circumstances beyond a family's control, the Parent Absence Policy has been put in place. This policy allows for exemptions **up to three times per school year** for reasons deemed sufficient *to the family requesting the exemption*. A Parent Absence is defined as any instance in which **someone other than one of the parents or permanent legal guardians listed on the Registration Contract** has responsibility for any of the children listed on the Registration Contract for all or part of a day at Legacy, and each instance must be documented as one of the three allowed absences.

Please be aware of the following steps you must take to send your children with an alternative adult temporary caregiver *up to three times per school year*. Please ensure that your children are fully aware of to whom they are accountable in your absence.

- A **Parent Off-site Form** (available at www.legacyhc.org under "Downloads & Forms") must be filled out completely and turned in at the Front Desk either in advance or upon arrival at Legacy on the day in question. This form must include the name of the individual who is covering your co-op job; the name, contact information, and signature of the adult who is assuming responsibility for your children; and must be signed by you and by a board member (see Front Desk).
- It is highly recommended that a completed medical authorization form be signed and given to the adult who is assuming responsibility for your children. A sample **Medical Authorization Form** may be downloaded from the "Downloads & Forms" page of our website.
- If you are sending your children with an adult who is not part of a current Legacy family, they must register at the Front Desk as a visitor.

Undocumented absences, more than three absences per school year, and/or failure to provide for the completion of your co-op job during your absence will jeopardize your privilege to participate in this co-op. For this reason, we cannot stress enough the need for discernment in applying this exemption to your family's situation. For ongoing medical situations or other extenuating circumstances, please contact the Legacy Board.

Sick or contagious family members and/or students may not attend Legacy.

Visitors to Legacy are required to sign in at the front desk and receive a name tag.

Designated Legacy Co-op boundaries: DO NOT use areas of the church that OCC has not invited Legacy to use. EMPTY CLASSROOMS, THE GYM, THE CHAPEL, HALLWAYS BEHIND THE ELEVATOR, AND STAIRWELLS ARE OFF LIMITS unless you are in class, traveling to or from class, or exiting the building in the case of an emergency. In order to adequately account for each student during an emergency, children are expected to remain in class or in the Lunch Room (Room #3) at all times unless accompanied by a parent or responsible adult, or carrying a **hall pass**. Students may not loiter in the hallways.

Eating Areas: Please honor all OCC signs denoting where food and drinks are allowed. Families are encouraged to eat together, and **each family is responsible for cleaning up after themselves**. Eating will not be permitted in the classrooms unless scheduled by the teacher.

Emergency procedures: In case of a **fire**, alarms will sound and all children should be evacuated in a quiet and orderly manner along assigned routes through clearly marked exits to safe areas away from the building. Please do not run. All classes must remain together with their teacher and facilitator. A Board member will notify teachers and facilitators when it is safe to re-enter the building. Should we be unable to enter the building again, teachers and facilitators must remain with their classes until parents locate their children. In the event of an **earthquake**, everyone should immediately get under a table and assume the duck and cover position. It is important that you stay away from any windows and remain in the room until given further instructions. In the event of a **non-evacuation emergency**, please listen for complete instructions. We will have unannounced emergency drills throughout the year.

LEGACY POLICIES AND EXPECTATIONS, continued

Legacy participants are expected to keep communication open and solve areas of conflict by using principles of peacemaking from Matthew 18:15-17, discussing any concerns directly with the parties involved, with gentleness and grace. For unresolved, persistent, or serious issues, the Board is available to facilitate discussion and to be made aware of specific behaviors which have raised your concern. This should be done in writing and must include your name and contact information. Anonymous complaints will not be considered.

All parents and children are to treat other parents, teachers, students, and our host facility/staff with courtesy and respect at all times. This includes, but is not limited to, cleaning up after themselves, not talking loudly in areas where classes are in session, and not running in the building. When in the Lunch Room, please be courteous of other students or families completing their work. In addition, the following rules apply to building use at OCC:

- No knives, guns, or other weapons (real or play); alcohol; or illegal drugs will be permitted on church premises.
- No balls, bikes, skateboards, scooters, or roller blades allowed on church premises.
- No pets are allowed on church premises except working service dogs.

Dress and conduct codes: In order to maintain an appropriate academic environment, all participants are expected to follow Legacy's dress and conduct codes.

- Clothing should be modest; excessive exposure of skin is inappropriate
- Skirt/short length must be below mid-thigh
- Bare midriffs, halter tops, spaghetti straps, and/or visible cleavage are unacceptable
- Underclothing should not be visible
- Shoes and shirts are required, both inside and outside the building
- Inappropriate physical affection and/or aggression will not be tolerated
- Foul language and/or bullying will not be tolerated

Students are expected to come to class on time (5 minutes before class begins, but no more than 10 minutes early) and prepared with completed assignments and all required books and materials.

Cell phone use is not allowed during class; this includes text messaging. Please silence your cell phone during class. Any student using a cell phone in class may have their phone confiscated by the teacher or facilitator until the end of class.

JOBS AT LEGACY

Each family will be required to fulfill an assigned job and be available to provide additional assistance if needed. Jobs that are assigned include janitorial, setup, cleanup/restoration, monitoring, and facilitating. Although we strive to assign jobs in keeping with your schedule and other requests, ***all jobs will be assigned based on the needs of Legacy.*** Please understand that your particular job may require you to be at Legacy up to 30 minutes before or after your student's class(es). This means that if you are assigned a setup or cleanup/restoration job at the beginning or end of the day, your responsibilities may extend beyond the beginning or end of class time.

If you are unable to fulfill your assigned job due to an absence, it is YOUR responsibility to find a replacement so that your job will be completed. If you drop a class and will no longer be at Legacy for the hour that your job is scheduled, you are required to fulfill your job until a replacement is found, or you are given a new job. You will be contacted concerning your job prior to the start of classes in the fall.

CLASSES AT LEGACY

Legacy Homeschool Center is not a school and does not maintain student transcripts. It is the parents' sole responsibility to maintain transcripts for their own children.

Legacy does not employ teachers. They are under the employ of the families who have students attending their classes. For this reason, we do not pay the teachers; you, the parents, pay the teachers directly through Legacy's Processing Center. The Board does, however, maintain supervisory authority. Each teacher must ascribe to our Statement of Faith and Mission Statement and submit to a Washington State Patrol Criminal History Background Check. While Legacy does its best to screen teachers for qualifications, we recognize that teaching style and personality vary among teachers and we in no way guarantee satisfaction with any particular teacher or class. Parents are encouraged to discuss concerns with the teacher before contacting the Board. For unresolved complaints based on personality or style, please withdraw quietly from the class without spreading dissension among other co-op families. For unresolved issues which are more serious in nature, please inform the Board of specific behaviors which have raised your concern, keeping in mind the need for discretion when discussing issues with others at Legacy.

LEGACY POLICIES AND EXPECTATIONS, continued

Canceled classes: Classes may be canceled at any time at the Board's discretion. If class is canceled due to teacher's absence, children may be sent to the Lunch Room. In the event of class cancellation/teacher absence, reasonable effort will be made to notify parents prior to class time. Teachers work many hours outside the classroom; therefore, if class(es) are canceled, **tuition will not be refunded.**

Class Enrollment: Students must obtain teacher permission to register for classes outside their grade/age range. Only students enrolled in the class are eligible to participate in class; **auditing (attending without paying tuition) is not permitted.** Parents are welcome and highly encouraged to sit in class **with their children**; however, parents are not eligible to enroll in classes. Parents who wish to sit in their student's class are encouraged to make alternative arrangements for their other children not enrolled in the class.

The Nursery is available for use by teachers and facilitators only, and only during the hour(s) they are in class. A one-time supply fee is due on the first day of Legacy in September. Please notify the Board if you will be using this service, and for which hour(s).

Waiting Lists: We cannot guarantee you will get the class(es) you request; however, each full class will maintain a waiting list. You may not be confirmed in a class and remain on the waiting list for a different class during the same hour. Students' names will be randomly selected to fill classes and waiting lists. Legacy reserves the right to prioritize enrollment of upperclassmen.

Pay tuition for classes on time. Payment must be turned in to the processing center at Legacy on or before the Tuition Due dates indicated on the Legacy Calendar (page 5). **Late payments will incur a late fee of \$20 per family per week.** Checks are made payable to the teacher and must include the student name and class time on the memo line. Cash payments are given directly to a processor. Please do not give checks or cash directly to the teacher. **All tuition and fees paid are nonrefundable**, including all tuition and fees paid over the summer and any tuition that you choose to pay in advance during the school year. School district funds may not be used to pay for tuition, fees, and/or registration, or for the reimbursement thereof.

Dropping classes: Please register your children for classes with the intention of participating from September to June. While situations occasionally make it necessary to drop a class mid-year, please keep in mind that this may have a negative impact on the teacher and the other students in the class. If you choose to drop any classes, you must notify the processing center for each class that you are dropping. If you are dropping Legacy entirely, please notify the processing center. When dropping a class, you will be required to pay an early withdrawal penalty equal to four weeks of tuition from the date that you give notice to the processing center. Your child is not permitted to attend the dropped class during this four week period.

COMMUNICATION AT LEGACY

The Legacy Bulletin will be sent out via email on Wednesday of each week Legacy is in session. Please read it completely for important updates and notification of upcoming events. If you are a current Legacy family and you are NOT receiving the bulletin, please inform the Board at info@legacyhc.org. The Legacy Bulletin will also be posted in the foyer near the mailboxes; please check this area and the whiteboard weekly for announcements.

Family Mailbox folders: Family mailbox folders are located in the foyer as a convenience for co-op participants to communicate co-op related information and to distribute approved literature. Mailboxes are not to be used for solicitation. Please check with the Board before distribution of material via the mailboxes. Legacy Homeschool Center is not responsible for the loss of any property distributed through or left in mailboxes. Each family mailbox folder will contain a current family schedule (parent maintained) to assist in locating parents/students as needed.

Bulletin board policy/disclaimer: A bulletin board in the foyer is available for notification and communication of homeschool information among co-op participants. Items included on the bulletin board do not necessarily constitute co-op board endorsement or promotion. As a nonprofit organization, we are prohibited by law from the "carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation," neither shall we "participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office."

Winter weather closure policy: In case of inclement weather, check the Legacy web site at www.legacyhc.org for closure information.

Emergency contact: We are independent of the church's operation and ask that you **do not call OCC regarding Legacy matters.** Please address all inquiries to Board members.

RETURNING FAMILY REGISTRATION: APRIL 3 - 10am to 2pm

1. Please review LEGACY POLICIES AND EXPECTATIONS.
2. Determine whether your children are being homeschooled according to the Home-Based Instruction law, RCW 28A.200.010. For more information, please visit the WHO web site at www.washhomeschool.org.
3. Complete and sign the *Registration Contract*. Returning families must use the prefilled contract provided. The contract must be signed both by the parents and by any students born prior to **May 31, 2002**.
4. Complete a *Class Selection Form* for each student you would like to enroll (one child per form).
 - Please make your selections carefully. Once class selection forms, registration contracts, and registration fees have been processed, **your registration is final. NO further changes, additions, etc., can be made** until on or after May 8, 2014.
 - **You may only register your child for classes that are listed within your child's age/grade limit.** If your child is outside the age/grade range for a class that you would like to register him/her for, you must have the teacher fill out a permission slip (available at the Information Desk) and wait until May 8, 2014, to add that class.
 - When you sign your child up for a class, please do so **with the intention of having your child remain in class for the entire year.** We understand there are situations that make it necessary to drop a class mid-year; however, please keep in mind that this may have a negative impact on the teacher and other students in the class.
 - If you register your student for the same class twice, in different hours, he/she **MAY BE DROPPED FROM ONE OF THE TWO IDENTICAL CLASSES** at the Board's discretion.
5. Write a check for \$145.00, made payable to **Legacy Homeschool Center**, to cover the registration / building use fee. This fee is **nonrefundable / nontransferable**.
6. Make a photocopy of the registration contract for your records (we do not have the ability to photocopy it for you).
7. Bring your completed *Registration Contract*, *Class Selection Form(s)*, and your registration / building use *fee* to Legacy on **April 3, 2014**, from 10am – 2pm.

Preliminary class lists from returning family registration will be posted at Legacy on May 1, 2014.

NOTES: Returning Families are those who registered for the 2013-2014 school year on or before January 31, 2014, are actively participating in Legacy, and are current on all class tuition for current and previous years.

If you will be out of town on registration day, please be sure to do one of the following:

- Bring your registration paperwork and check to the registrar before leaving town, or
- Have a friend turn in your registration paperwork and check for you on registration day, or
- Send your registration paperwork and check to P.O. Box 3325, Redmond, WA 98073-3325, postmarked no later than March 29, 2014.

Check the Legacy website for class updates prior to registration; changes may occur after printing this packet.

RETURNING FAMILY CLASS PAYMENTS DUE: MAY 8 - before 2pm

8. Class Payment: Provide **one nonrefundable check per student per class**, payable to the teacher, which includes **materials fee plus first month's tuition** by 2pm at Legacy on **May 8, 2014**. Checks should be postdated* for June 15, 2014. Your checks secure your student's enrollment in class. **Any unsecured spots will be offered to students on the waiting list.**
 - **ADD/DROP NOTE:** Before adding a class during an hour for which you hold a confirmed spot, you must drop the confirmed class spot. **You may not hold a confirmed spot and be on a class waiting list** for the same hour.
- Final class lists** will be posted at Legacy on May 29, 2014.
9. Provide a copy of your Declaration of Intent to homeschool to the Front Desk on or before September 25, 2014.

* Postdated checks: Every attempt will be made to hold these checks until dated; however, in the event they are deposited earlier, your bank will honor these checks and cash them. To avoid overdraft fees, make sure you have the money in your account to cover these checks.

NEW FAMILY REGISTRATION: APRIL 17 - 10am to 12 noon

2. Determine whether your children are being homeschooled according to the Home-Based Instruction law, RCW 28A.200.010. For more information, please visit the WHO web site at www.washhomeschool.org.
3. Complete and sign the *Registration Contract*, available at the Front Desk at Legacy or for download from www.legacyhc.org. The contract must be signed both by the parents and by any students born prior to **May 31, 2002**.
4. Complete a *Class Selection Form* for each student you would like to enroll (one child per form).

Conceptual Physics with Lab – Rhonda Zeuschel

Grade: 9 - 12

Class Size: 8 to 16

Cost: \$45 monthly, \$80 materials

Text: Student to purchase: Conceptual Physics, The High School Physics Program, Hewitt, 2009 Pearson Education. ISBN#: 0-13-364749-8 or 978-0-13-364749-5 .

Prerequisites: Completion of Algebra I and access to internet. Ninth grade students need to have completed Physical Science.

Student Expectations: Completion of all assignments as instructed. Students are required to maintain a minimum grade of 76% to remain in class. For detailed class syllabus and sample online lesson, go to the class website at: www.zscience.edu20.org

Description: Physics, the most fundamental of the sciences, is a study of matter, energy, space and time. As a former chemical engineer, I understand the importance of understanding the foundational concepts in science. Students who master the elegant concepts of physics are capable of adding an algebraic approach in college. Homeschool students with limited class time who learn the mathematical approach first usually master the art of blindly plugging numbers into an equation without understanding the concept behind the equation. Therefore, this is a conceptual course. Class time includes brief lecture followed by lab. The latest technology in computerized sensors is used extensively in labs. Homework includes reading text, completing online tutorials and homework, and writing occasional lab reports. Homework is expected to take 5 - 8 hours/week.

High School Chemistry – Cydney Adler

Grade: 10 - 12

Class Size: 8 to 20

Description: This class is a high school level survey of literature from a variety of countries including England, Russia, France, Africa, and Asia. In addition to reading and discussing a wide range of novels from different cultures, students will write literary analyses focusing on literary concepts such as character, point of view, conflict, theme, and symbolism. Students should be strong, independent readers, and capable of constructing a multi-paragraph essay.

Student Expectations: Please contact teacher to order phonogram cards if you did not complete the first class.

Description: As we continue on the Writing Road to Reading, students will continue their mastery of the 70 phonograms of the English language. We will go further into the spelling list, and will focus on mastering the more difficult phonograms not mastered in the first Writing Road to Reading class. We will begin using our spelling words to make sentences and paragraphs, and learn the basics of grammar and sentence structure. We will also read excerpts from quality literature together and focus on authors' purpose and comprehension techniques. This will continue the multi-sensory approach to Language Arts on a more advanced level than the first class. This class will not only engage your child in learning the seven continents, but will carefully help your child develop the skills it takes to strengthen their letter formation skills. We will travel the world, learning about various animals and their habitats. Weekly, students will follow step by step drawings of animals. We will also review how to form each letter as we copy down carefully selected texts. Students will be encouraged to use their creativity by adding to the background of each scene. No Homework!

Arithmetic 6th Grade Level – Kristine Grigas

Grade: 5 - 10

Class Size: 8 to 20

Cost: \$28 monthly, \$15 materials

Text: Student to purchase: Abeka Arithmetic 6 workbook, Code #: 157368, Arithmetic 6 Answer Key, Code #: 167398, and Arithmetic 6 Test and Quiz book, Code #: 157384

Prerequisites: Completion of a thorough 5th grade arithmetic course

Description: This course focuses on helping students to master important arithmetic skills and concepts. These include challenging problems in the core arithmetic operations of addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division. Students will develop skills working with decimals, fractions, percents, measurement, and scientific notation. The students will also be introduced to algebra and geometry. Four homework lessons are assigned each week. Students complete daily lessons, then correct using the answer key. Exploring Creation with General Science – Cydney Adler**Grade:** 6 - 8**Class Size:** 8 to 20**Cost:** \$25 monthly, \$50 materials

Text: Student to purchase: Exploring Creation with General Science (hardbound), 2nd Edition, Dr. Jay Wile, Publisher: Apologia Educational Ministries, ISBN-10: 1932012869 ISBN-13: 978-1932012866. Please have text first day of class. Teacher provided: Notebooking Journal.

Prerequisites: Able to read, write and comprehend information at the 5th grade level

Student Expectations: Students will be expected to read 15 - 20 pages of text, complete notebook activities, and do experimental write-up for each chapter. Two weeks per chapter.

Description: Designed to be a student's first systematic introduction to the sciences, this course includes a history of science, the scientific method, and how to design an experiment. Subjects covered include simple machines, archaeology, geology, paleontology, biology, and human anatomy and physiology. Many hands-on experiments.

Geography and History of the USA – Kathie Stabbert**Grade:** 3 - 5**Class Size:** 8 to 20**Cost:** \$18 monthly, \$40 materials**Text:** Teacher provided: Notebook**Prerequisites:** None

Description: Beginning with the nation's capital and progressing through all 50 states, students learn a lot of basic information about their country. By the end of the year, they will know their capitals, where the states are located, what is unique about the various regions of the country and some history that occurred in the different states. Each week the students are given a few handouts to help them learn about the states to be discussed. Each student will give two reports throughout the year. The first report is a 5-10 minute presentation on the state of their choice. The second report is to read a book about someone important to the United States and share a report about what they learned.

We will study major British authors such as Charles Dickens, Jane Austen and C.S. Lewis, as well as read a variety of literary genres such as Chaucer's *Canterbury Tales*, a play by Shakespeare, the poetry of Donne, Wordsworth, and Keats, and the satirical writings of Jonathan Swift. We will discuss literary terms such as plot, characterization, historical context and irony and practice critically thinking and writing about these concepts in essays. The student should be familiar with writing a standard five-paragraph essay, but instruction will be given on how to adapt this form into a literary analysis essay.**Junior Book Club Level 1 – Krystal Ripley****Grade:** 1 - 2**Class Size:** 8 to 12**Cost:** \$25 monthly, \$45 materials**Text:** Student to purchase or acquire from library: Up to four books will be required for the parent to purchase. Students will be educated on proper terminology in the world of fitness and given training in warm-up, stretching, and cool-down routines. Honors Biology – Rhonda Zeuschel

Grade: 9 - 12

Class Size: 8 to 16

Cost: \$45 monthly, \$80 materials

Text: Student to purchase either:

Biology with Laboratory Exercises for Christian Schools, BJUP, 3rd Ed (vol A&B), ISBN: 978-1-57924-932-8 OR Biology, BJUP, 2011, 4th Ed. ISBN: 978-1-60682-017-9

Prerequisites: 9th Grade Students must have completed Physical Science with a minimum B grade. Priority will be given to students in grades 10-12.

Student Expectations: As this is an "Honors" level course, students are expected to complete all assignments as instructed and turn them in on time. A minimum grade of 76% must be maintained. Students who fall below this grade will be asked to drop the class.

Description: This course is an advanced approach to Biology as the first semester focuses on biochemistry, genetics, microbiology, and biotechnology. The second semester covers botany, zoology, and human anatomy. While brief multimedia lectures are presented to introduce the topic, students are expected to learn the textbook material at home to facilitate weekly labs during class. Biochemistry and microbiology labs include, but are not limited to: DNA extraction, gel electrophoresis (DNA fingerprinting), transformation of bacterial DNA, and use of microscopes for cytology and microbiology. Zoology labs include skeletal remains identification, eye, heart and brain dissections, as well as invertebrate, frog, and fetal pig dissections. Formal lab report writing is taught. Homework will take 4-8 hours per week - no late work accepted - Internet connection required.

Illustration: Level One – Michael McDevitt

Grade: 9 - 12

Class Size: 6 to 10

Cost: \$50 monthly, \$100 materials

Text: Student to purchase: personal supplies \$100

Prerequisites: Draw & Sketch: Advanced or special permission

Description: This is a very advanced class for creating realistic art. Self starters will do well. We will be polishing existing skills necessary for real world assignments. Strong conceptual thinking, design, and presentation will be the goal. Problem solving and student interaction will dominate the process. The majority of the work will be done in black and white, but color will be investigated. High levels of craftsmanship will be stressed throughout. Homework (five hours or more) will be assigned weekly. Peer and teacher critiques will be routine. Some research and writing will be required. This class will be very useful to students preparing for college level art programs and ateliers.

Musical Theatre/Broadway Revue – Tina Matlock

Grade: 9 - 12

Class Size: 15 to 25

Cost: \$30 monthly, \$70 materials

Text: Teacher provided

Prerequisites: None

Student Expectations: This performance class is NOT like a typical class – it requires teamwork. One person failing to learn his part causes problems for everyone else. Students are expected to practice their music and choreography at home and memorize their parts.

Description: The focus of this class is to give students the opportunity to perform. Students will work on vocal technique and stage movement/choreography as they put together solo, duet, and ensemble numbers from stage and movie musicals that will result in a Revue tailored to the talents of the students enrolled. The Revue will be presented as their final project on the second to last Thursday of Legacy. Due to the nature of the class ATTENDANCE IS VERY IMPORTANT. Meeting once a week does not allow for enough rehearsal time, so there will be out-of-class rehearsals scheduled for solo work, dress rehearsal, and days when Legacy cannot meet at OCC.
