Description: This is a Christ-centered, college-prep biology course that provides a detailed introduction to the methods and concepts of general biology. It provides the student with a strong background in the scientific method, the five-kingdom classification scheme, microscopy, biochemistry, cellular biology, molecular and Mendelian genetics, creation vs. evolution, dissection, and ecosystems. It also provides a complete survey of the five kingdoms in Creation. This is an intensive study which will prepare students for college level classes. Class time will be used for lecture, videos and experiments.

They will be expected to learn and present weekly portions and whole chapters. Asking questions in engaging in discussions is critical.**Description:** Colossians is a deep dive into the person of Jesus Christ, His Supremacy, our freedom in Him, how He has designed Christians to live and God's redemption of His people through Jesus Christ- revealing the true identity of the believer in certain, compelling terms. Comparative Religions: *Shawna Alexander***Time:** 9:00 AM to 10:00 AM**Grade:** 8 to 12**Class Size:** 4 to 25**Cost:** \$28.60 monthly, \$40.00 materials**Text (Provided by Teacher):** Discussions will be based on several sources, including, but not limited to, World Religions and Cults Volumes 1-2 by Bodie Hodge and Roger Patterson.**Text (Provided by Student):** Notebook for note-taking and homework.**Description:** A world religion is a belief system that attempts to explain some aspect of reality and often how the physical and spiritual world operations: and yet is independent of another world religion (although they often have different sects, cults, or denominations). For example, Buddhism, secular humanism, and biblical Christianity are entirely different religions that do not share a common historical foundation. Each of these religions has variations within its constituents - Buddhism includes Mahayana and Theravada forms; Biblical Christianity includes denominations such as Lutheran and Baptist; and secular humanism includes atheism, agnosticism, and the like. This course will examine many world religious views, always with a focus on the Word of God's truth as the standard, and with a heart of compassion to share the Gospel to all. The goal of this course is not to become experts on the many different religions throughout the world, but to become equipped to not only understand the errors within differing religious views, but also point the followers to the only hope of salvation - Jesus Christ. Description: To improve aerobic capacity, muscular strength, endurance and flexibility. Aerobic conditioning will be achieved through outdoor running and hill climbing. Muscular strength will be gained through weight training and floor exercises. Muscular and cardiovascular endurance will be increased through supersetting and circuit type training. Flexibility is enhanced through a series of dynamic and static stretching. It is strongly recommended that students perform assigned workouts 3-4 days per week to achieve optimal results and to avoid injury. Exercise routines that can and should be performed at home will be covered. A fitness assessment will be conducted at the beginning, mid-year and at the end of the school year to gauge overall improvement in each category. Student Expectations: Parent-guided internet access for listening assignments. Ideally students play an instrument or sing, but are still very welcome in the class as new music students if they are motivated to apply themselves.

Description: The Gift Of Music course includes music appreciation and history, and physics of sound. Students will have opportunities to fine tune their own music abilities and appreciation through: drills and games, worksheets, experiments, role-play by reading scripted historical dramas based on true anecdotes, videos of performances and physics demonstrations, and a chance to play their instrument (if they do) for the class when it applies to the lesson we are studying. Class Size: 6 to 12

Text (Provided by Teacher): 1st Semester: Writing and Rhetoric: Book 3: Narrative II from Classical Academic Press 2nd Semester: Writing and Rhetoric: Book 4: Chreia & Proverb from Classical Academic Press

Description: Using whole stories we will walk through the process of learning how to think and write. Semester 1: Our focus will be on narratives and semester 2 we will study chreia (a brief, useful anecdote about a character) and proverbs. For semester one we will focus on the types of narratives, protagonist/antagonists, and the 5 Ws of a historical narrative-who, what, when, where, and why. Using the stories from the book, we will practice summarizing, rewriting, and creating narratives. Semester 2: We will focus on using the skills gained in the previous book to write a 6 paragraph essay based on a saying or action.

We will study Native Americans with Kaya, America's Southwest Frontier with Josefina, early pioneer life with Kirsten, the Great Depression with Kit, and WW2 with Molly. This class includes weekly discussions, maps and timelines, Native American dress design and sewing, crafts, presentations, and your favorite and mine... a dollie and me tea party. Process Art is child-directed, choice-driven, and celebrates the experience of discovery. The final product is always unique and focus is placed on the creation, not the outcome. Stations providing unique sensory experiences include paint, clay, dough, paper and other materials are available. Each class will include a creative inspiration and a demonstration of a technique and use of materials. Students are then free to create and explore as they choose.

Digital Photography and Photobooking: *Bonnie Debu***Time:** 10:10 AM to 11:10 AM**Grade:** 7 to 12**Class Size:** 2 to 15**Cost:** \$27.60 monthly, \$10.00 materials**Text (Provided by Teacher):** Binder for homework and guidelines handouts**Prerequisites:** Basic computer skills (You should know how to get around on a computer, you should know how to save a file) Parental permission to access and upload to free online Photo editing software (pixlr) and Shutterfly websites**Student Expectations:** You will need to bring a charged laptop, charging cable, and be connected to the Legacy network for each class. You will need a digital camera, preferably an SLR, but a simpler digital camera or even a smartphone can work, too, if the camera takes nice pictures. (You will get the very most out of the class with a digital SLR, but even I will be using my phone for a lot of stuff we will be doing.) You will need your own SD card, not used by others in your family. It may be necessary to use a smartphone as a hotspot. Really nice to have but not required: tripod**Description:** Photobooks are an artistic and impressive way to treasure your memories, and creating them incorporates computer skills, artistic design, writing and photography. I have been a prolific photobook creator for 15 years. In this class you will work on photographic techniques, color choices, composition, storytelling, using apps for artistic effect and photo editing and artistic layouts. Each student will learn to upload pictures to Shutterfly, to take quality photographs and to compile a family album with specific, internal assignments, plus at least one more album of your own design, whether it is another family album, a personal interest album, storytelling or art. You will be referred to videos of professional photographers giving quality tips, and handouts outlining specific assignments for your main album. This class can be taken for credit, or for enrichment. The albums sold by Shutterfly are free to design, but you have to purchase the book you design to get it in your hands. The final cost of your album is determined by page numbers, available sales, choices made while creating the album, and other factors made before you order, and is not part of your class fees. Only you can order your album once it has been created. I create my albums with attention to budgeting details, and this will be discussed in the first class. Once your albums are ordered, they can be shared digitally with friends online.**Exploring Words: *Karen Dennis*****Time:** 10:10 AM to 11:10 AM**Grade:** 2 to 4**Class Size:** 6 to 15**Cost:** \$20.40 monthly, \$64.00 materials**Text (Provided by Teacher):** Exploring Words by Carrie Myers - notebook, curriculum, and vocabulary cards**Prerequisites:** Ability to write the Greek and Latin vocabulary cards done in class (Parents may help in class if necessary.)**Student Expectations:** Students are expected to come each week with a good attitude and an excitement to learn. Parents are encouraged to sit in each week so they can learn alongside and encourage their children during the week at home.**Description:** Exploring Words gives children an opportunity to have fun with words while discovering tips and tricks to better reading, spelling, and comprehension. New book pricey but E-book, used and rentals also available. Be sure to get 2nd edition. Please have on first day of class.**Prerequisites:** Successful completion of a high school level science class. such as Physical Science, Biology, Chemistry, etc.**Student Expectations:** Students will read ~ 20 pages per week, answer review questions and maintain a Laboratory Notebook. Homework will be 2-3 hours per week.**Description:** Forensic science or "forensics" is the application of a broad spectrum of sciences to answer questions of interest to the legal system. Learn and use concepts from biology, chemistry, physics, history and political science to analyze and evaluate evidence. Learn techniques for evidence collection and wrap your mind around deductive reasoning puzzles. Many hands-on activities and intriguing case studies make this an interesting and engaging class. Class time will include lecture, labs, and videos.
